Dear Parents / Carers,

Salvatorian College is entering an exciting new chapter with the rebuild of the campus on the High Road. This rebuild will provide extended, modern accommodation for the school, fit for the twenty-first century.

I will be working closely with Governors to ensure we embed our vision as we begin this new chapter in the school's history. We are instilling a culture of hard work, high expectations a culture of learning from, and sharing with our new partners and stakeholders. We aspire to be a place of growth and opportunity for all, which is central to our Catholic ethos.

I believe we are making good progress, and our new building will give us the space and facilities we need.

However, our ambition goes further than this. The Governors wish to ensure Salvatorian College provides the very best in resources for learning. Over the next few years we will be restocking and expanding our library; we will be upgrading our computers and ICT resources; we will be improving our on-site sporting provision.

These ambitions cost money, and against a climate of cut-backs in government funding, we need to find additional sources of funding.

In December 2016 we launched the 'Deo Duce Fund' aimed at alumni and friends of the school. We have already raised a 5-figure sum through their generosity, and the aim is to raise a further £90,000 for the Fund this year.

From tonight, you will see a new payment item available on ParentPay. We are asking each pupil's parent or family to consider making an annual donation of £120 – just £10 per month – towards the '**Governors' Fund**'. This Fund will complement the 'Deo Duce Fund', and all income will be spent on improving resources, improving the learning environment, and expanding the curriculum.

There is no obligation to make any contribution. The school has a strong culture of 'giving back', and a supportive and generous community who support us in various different ways. We are extremely grateful for any contribution you feel you can make.
