Monday - Initiate

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Fifth Sunday of Easter (Year B) Sunday 29th April 2018 A reading from the Gospel of John 15:1-8:

'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers: such branches are



gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

In this parable, Jesus uses the metaphor of a vine and its branches. He is the vine who feeds and nourishes us, the branches. Our job is to bear much fruit in our good works.

At first glance, this is quite a challenging parable. It suggests that Jesus provides support, but that the ultimate responsibility for delivering the good news of the Gospel lies with us, and us alone – we are put 'in the driving seat'.

This is in contrast to last week's gospel where Jesus describes himself as the 'good shepherd' – a more easy-going picture where we can think of ourselves as sheep who merely follow in the shepherd's footsteps.

The worry is that we are found not worthy of Jesus; that we do not bear fruit and are cast away like an unproductive vine branch.

But what kind of fruit ought we to bear? What sort of 'fruit' is acceptable to the Lord? And how do we actually go about 'bearing fruit'? Of course, this is the language of analogy; we are not talking about a harvest of actual grapes! When Jesus talks about himself as a vine, he is talking about a vine of a heavenly order. The fruit we bear, therefore, must be of a heavenly order. We must try to imitate Christ in all we do, by comforting the sick, looking out for the poor, praying, and communing with God, and sacrificing ourselves for others.

If we can improve ourselves by imitating Christ here, today, we are assured of being united to the heavenly vine that is Jesus Christ our Lord: "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing."


