MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF **SCHOOL**

Our school community at Salvatorian College continues to thrive under the "new normal" of Covid restrictions and I am pleased to say that, on the whole, the boys are responding well to the new routines and increased expectations of hygiene and social distancing. You will recall that I wrote to you in July setting out the measures that we are taking to mitigate the risks of Covid-19. One of those measures is a staggered exit from school, using different exits and different times for each year group. Unfortunately, many of our boys have been congregating in different year groups to go into the shops near school. On Thursday, I told all of our boys that they were not allowed to go into any of the shops within the vicinity of the school, and that they must go straight home, in order to help keep our community safe. Please would you reinforce this message as any boy not following these instructions may receive a sanction.

On Friday, we held a drop-down day of enrichment events for our boys. These included workshops on careers, staying safe online, mental health, mindfulness, life skills and British values. We also held a session on Black History, as part of our celebration of Black History Month. The latest edition of The Salvatorian has a number of pages dedicated to pupil and staff responses to Black Lives Matter, and I recommend that you take some time to look through this excellent publication which can be found on our website.

We held a face to face, socially distanced Open Evening on Monday this week which was very well attended. It was a pleasure to show our guests around the school and premier our new promotional video, also found on our website, which I encourage you to share with friends and family. We will also be holding a virtual Open Evening on 15th October, which parents can sign up to on our website.

The boys are working hard, but I would like to increase our commitment to homework and ask that you do your part. Please make sure your boys have a quiet space to study and that you check with them, every night, what assignments they need to complete. Research indicates that homework helps our boys consolidate the learning from the day and enables them to deepen their understanding of the topics learned in school that day.

The Wedding Party


