Message from the Headteacher

There is no doubt that we are living in interesting times and that the last couple of years have been turbulent: Brexit, the impact of the pandemic, the Ukrainian Russian conflict, the climate emergency, the deteriorating economic situation and the prospect of a new Prime Minister and the third Education Secretary in as many weeks!

However, we need to be optimistic, put our trust in the Lord and take the opportunity to work together as a community. Things will get better and we will support each other as best we can. The parable of the Good Samaritan in Sunday's gospel reminds us that everyone is our neighbour.

Last week was possibly the busiest of our school year to date. I listened in the Staff Briefing as we were told about: the homegrown performance of Lord of the Flies, by a cast of pupils; the Duke of Edinburgh expedition and the Adventure Trip to Wales, the Year 11 paintballing trip; and, visits from Years 5 and 6 from neighbouring primary schools. The End of year exams are coming to a close for Years 7-10 and a number of local trips are being organized including a visit to the Science Museum; clearly, we are not winding down quietly at Salvatorian College. We still have our sports day to come, which is eagerly anticipated.

The final Governing Board meeting for the Academy Year was held last week. We give particular thanks for the adept leadership of the retiring Chair, Mr. John McAleer, who has worked tirelessly in the background to support the improvements the school has enjoyed over that last eight years.

Overall, we are pleased with the way that the year has progressed. Although Covid is still with us (increasing numbers of boys and staff are testing positive), the operation of the school has gone back to normal and we are pleased that the vast majority of the pupils have 'caught up'. Thank you to parents for all the help and support you have given your child. We are looking to complement this with extra interventions and bespoke support during the Summer School week.

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What a busy term this has been. Year 11 pupils sat three GCSE papers including Catholic Christianity, Judaism, Philosophy & Ethics to complete their course. A big thank you to Miss Williams and Mr Lloyd-Williams for going above and beyond to revise with our students.

Key Stage 3 have been busy studying world religions.

Pupils have particularly enjoyed the introduction course on Hinduism, seeing different Hindu deities being displayed in the RE classrooms and learning about the vast array of gods and goddesses as well as Hindu beliefs about karma and reincarnation.

Year 9 have begun an introduction into Judaism in preparation for the start of their GCSE course next academic year. They have had the opportunity to explore the basic differences between the various Jewish denominations, the history of the Jewish people, the role of the rabbi, the 13 principles of faith to name just of the few areas they have explored. The boys have engaged activity with what it means to be Jewish, through film, discussion and the use artefacts and have a solid foundation to begin their GCSE course in next year.

Our Year 10 pupils are currently studying Forms and Expressions of Religious Life, a module which covers religious artwork and music as well as the design and purpose of churches and sacred objects. One piece of religious art we

have studied is the Christ Pantocrator which shows the two natures of Christ as fully human and fully divine – ask your child to explain this to you!


for the reservation of the Blessed Sacrament within the school chapel – so that Christ is truly at the centre of our school.

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A new initiative to enrich the Catholic Life of boys this year has been the establishment of the Guild of St Stephen. The Guild of St Stephen is an international organisation of altar servers committed to assisting the clergy with serving for Masses, learning more about the liturgies and worship of the church, and learning more about the Catholic faith in general.

We were delighted to receive formal approval from the Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, in December 2021, to form a Chapter of the Guild of St Stephen at Salvatorian College. We believe we are one of only a few, if not the only, school in the UK to have its own Chapter.

With the generous support of staff, notably Mr Fowler and, with the spiritual guidance of the School Chaplain, Fr Mario, the guild has also provided opportunities for a blend social activities and excursions to religious shrines, with the aim to broaden both the cultural and spiritual lives of our students; such visits have included: Tyburn Convent, Marble Arch, a centre of devotion to Catholic martyrs of the Ukrainian Reformation: the Catholic Cathedral, Westminster and, a more recent visit to the Basilica of Our Lady of Walsingham, Norfolk, the national shrine to Our Lady. Further excursions are planned for the coming academic vear.



Guild Trips in 2021-22

14th December - the Shrine of the English Martyrs at Tyburn Convent

We took the train to Paddington which is a short walk from the Tyburn Convent. One of the associates showed us around the shrine in the crypt of the convent which contains many hundreds of relics of the English Martyrs.

The tour concluded with a period of prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament. The sisters in the convent take turns to pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament 24 hours a day, 365 days a year!



We then walked the short distance to the site of the Tybum gallows which was the site of many of the Martyr Saints' executions. The site is now in the middle of a traffic island at Marble Arch! We said a prayer litany for the English Martyrs. A great trip learning about the Catholic history of our country and our city of London.

12th January 2022 – Feast of Candlemass at the Rosary Shrine

We were invited by the Prior, The Very Rev Fr Lawrence Lew, to attend the Feast of Candlemass at St Dominic's Priory, which is the Diocesan Shrine to the Rosary.

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There, we were given a tour by Fr Andrew Brooks of the side chapels – each one dedicated to a different mystery of the rosary. We then attended Vespers and Mass which included a procession around the church with candles to celebrate the feast.




23rd March – Behind the scenes tour of Westminster Cathedral

We were invited by the Head Sacristan of Westminster Cathedral, Mr Richard Hawker, for a behind the scenes tour of the Cathedral. Mr Hawker gave us a tour of the side chapels - each decorated richly in different styles and materials. We then went to the enormous sacristy where we were shown some of the very valuable liturgical Cathedral's items in the collection. Afterwards we were taken right up into the galleries of the Cathedral where we had a spectacular view of the Byzantine domed architecture, and then down into the crypt


where we saw the tombs of previous Archbishops of Westminster. We then attended Vespers in the Lady Chapel and Mass, both sung by the world-famous Cathedral Choir.

7th May – International Rosary for Young People

Saturday, 7th May, pupils On from Salvatorian College and the Sacred Heart Language College, helped to lead a livestreamed Rosary which was broadcast around the world. The Rosary was the culmination of an international conference on Catholic education held in Italy, at which Mr Creamer gave a keynote speech. The conference was headed by Cardinal Giuseppe Versaldi, prefect for the Congregation for Catholic Education (the church's highest official for Catholic Education). It was a great honour to hear him personally thank the pupils of Salvatorian College for their contribution.



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11th June – Pilgrimage to Walsingham- a report from one budding reporter who wishes to remain anonymous

The Medieval Abbey at Walsingham in Norfolk was England's preeminent shrine to Our Lady until the Reformation and one of the most famous pilgrimage destinations in Europe. The shrine saw a significant revival in the 19th Century and is once more a focus of pilgrimage and devotion for Christians in England and across the world.

The day began with a breakfast roll (chips for some!) in Thetford Forest, before we wound our way down the country lanes to the picture-postcard village of Walsingham.

We walked the 'Holy Mile' to the Roman Catholic National Shrine to Our Lady where we attended Mass celebrated by the Bishop of Nottingham, Bishop Patrick McKinney. After a visit to the Slipper Chapel - so-called because medieval pilgrims removed their shoes before walking the final mile to the original Abbey of Walsingham - we walked back to the village through the fields and vineyards.

We enjoyed and a visit to the Anglican Shrine, before heading down to the beach at Wells-next-the-Sea for a paddle.

After all our exertion we were in need of fish & chips which fuelled us all the way back to Harrow.

This term The Art Department had a host of visitors to create some Art.



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


We believe that teachers and staff are still learners, and we encourage all staff to attend the Art room and learn some new skills.






In Year 9, students have been designing their own Salvatorian buildings as part of their Architecture project using TinkerCAD.



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



'I just want to reiterate how well behaved and helpful your boys were yesterday. They were very good role models for our children and they modelled the activities to them and gave them lots of encouragement.'









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


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Brunel University Weightlifting Experience

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
British Basketball League Play Off Finals at The O2




