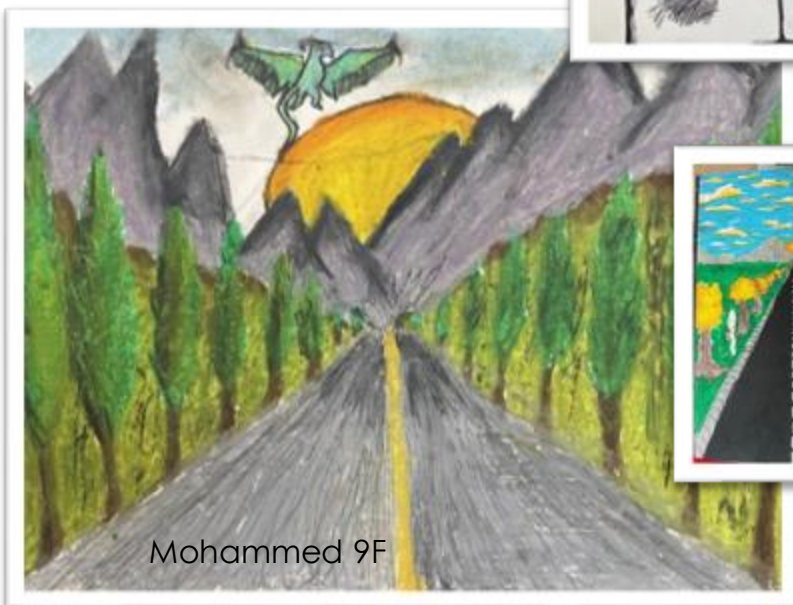
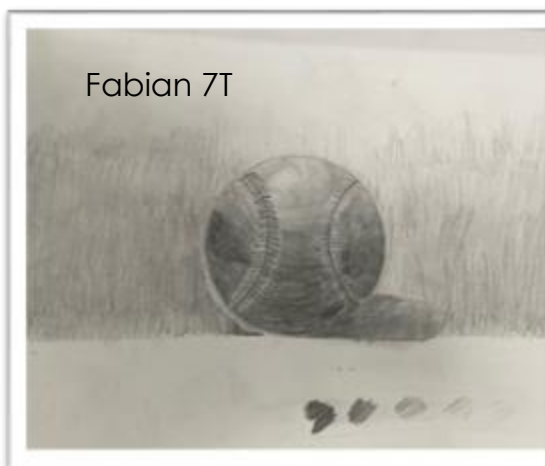
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Art & Design

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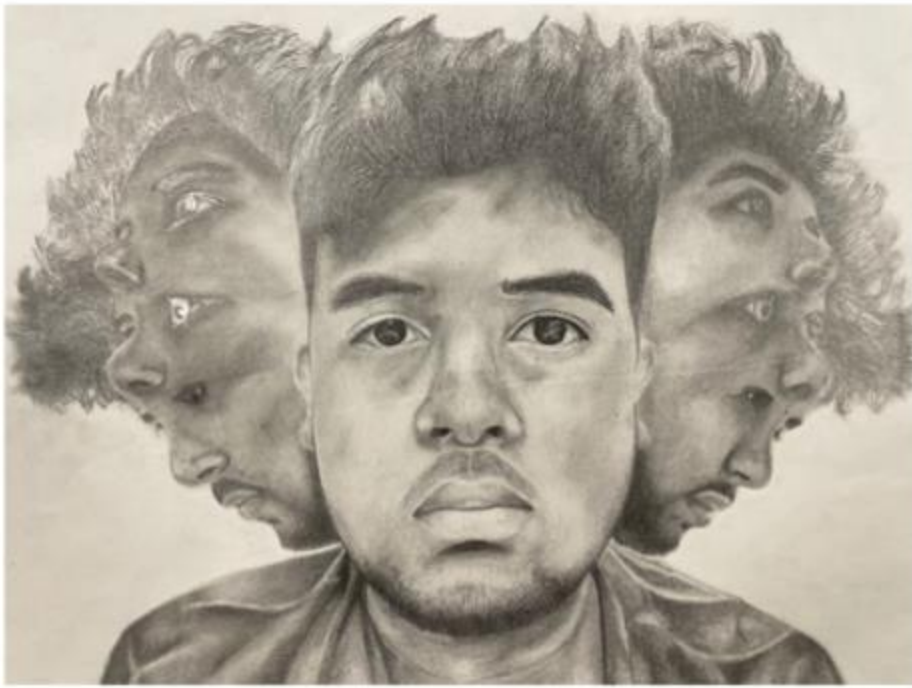
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Summer 2022 Exam work

Year 11 sat their mock exam and produced some fantastic work.



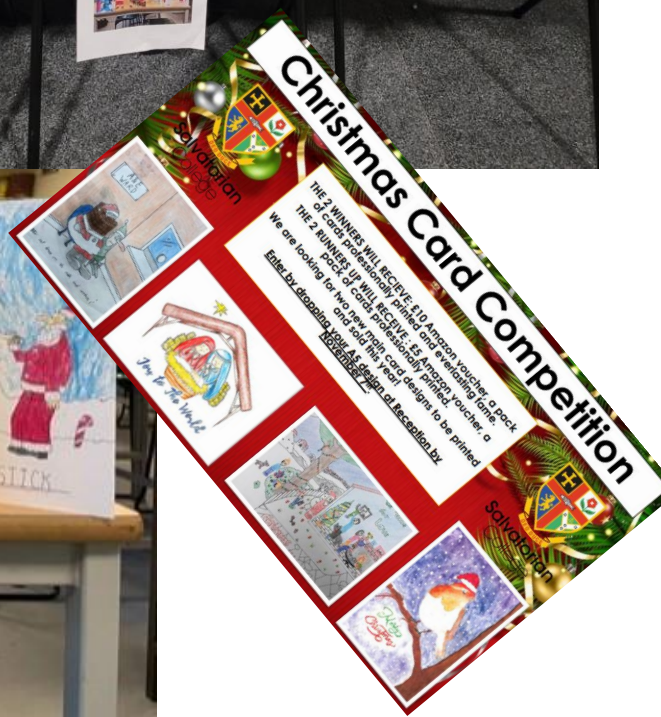
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Christmas Card Competition in Art

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Computing

This term in Computer Science year 9 have dived into what really makes a computer tick, right down to its 1's and 0's. Binary is a number system that only uses two digits: 1 and 0. All information that is processed by a computer is in the form of a sequence of 1s and 0s. Therefore, all data that we want a computer to process needs to be converted into binary, this includes images, videos and games. Students were challenge with understanding and working out how a computer converts our number system (0-9) in to something the computer can understand, binary (0-1). Applying this knowledge students were then able to convert a range of different values into binary and vice versa.

Bit - Smallest binary unit Holds a single value, either 0 or 1
Byte - Eight bits
Nibble - Four bits
Binary - made up of 1s and 0s

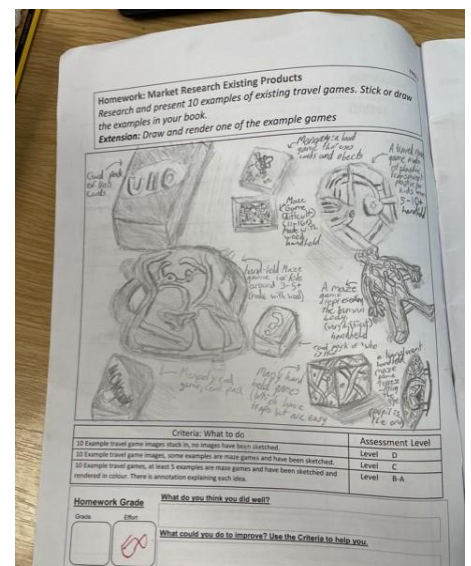

In year 9, students have been learning how to design and make clocks from wood, inspired by design movements Art Deco and Bauhaus.



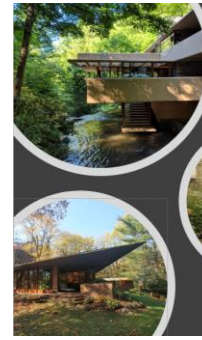
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Year 11 3D Design

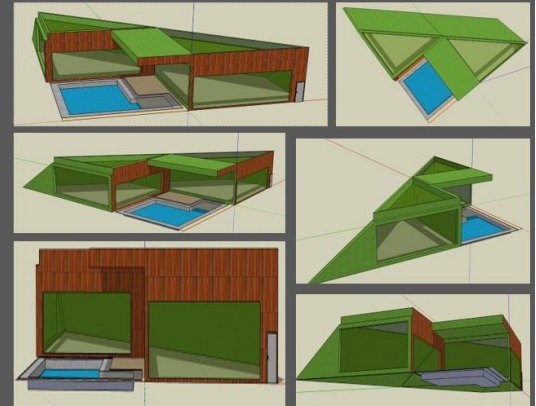


Frank Lloyd wright case study

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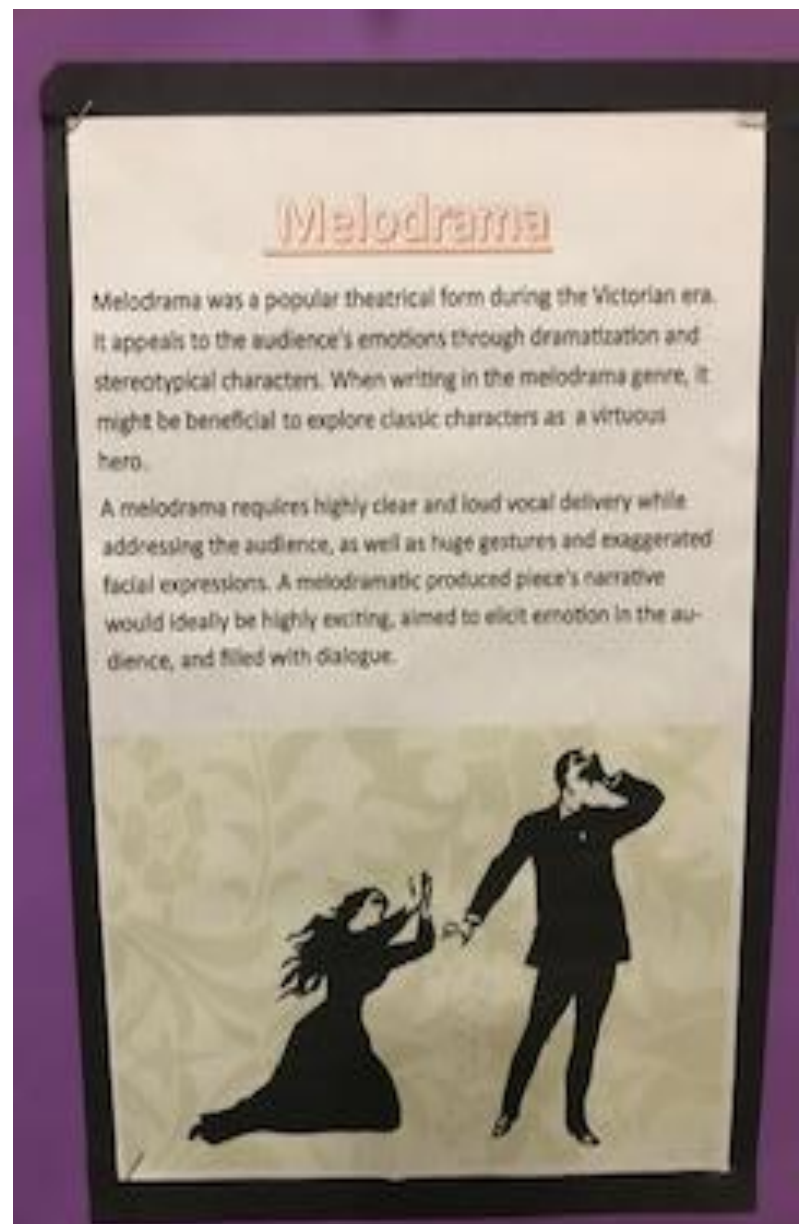
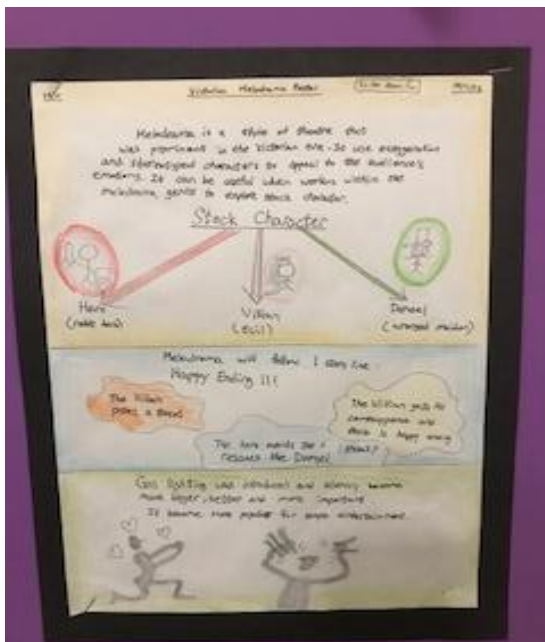
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Melodrama

Geography

In October all year 11 pupils taking GCSE geography went on a trip to Kew Gardens in Richmond. The focus of this trip was looking at ecosystems and the specific adaptations that plants may have to their environments. In order to ensure a link to their GCSE learning the focus was on tropical rainforests and desert ecosystems as this is what they will be assessed on. There were two sessions during the day, one led by educational staff from Kew Gardens and the other one self-led by the pupils in small groups.

The session led by staff members from Kew Gardens was focused on tropical rainforest adaptations, specifically how plants adapt to humid environments. Pupils then applied their own knowledge to discuss the importance of these plants in society today. Some groups looked at plants that could be used for weaving and others looked at plants which are integral in today's society such as palm oil.

Whilst one group did that the other group looked at adaptations within deserts. Plants such as the Welwitschia tree (tree tumbo) were looked at in great detail as it has the longest-lived leaves out of any plant and can survive for millennia in arid lands. Pupils got to explore and discover different types of cactuses and even saw a Venus fly trap in action.

The trip had great educational importance and helped show the boys that what they learn about in the classroom can be seen across the world. It served as a reminder that geography is not just in a textbook but that the theory behind their knowledge is ever present and ever changing.

Visit to the National Gallery

Years 8 had the amazing opportunity to visit the National Gallery with the MFL department. There, they discovered some of the most important French and Spanish painters. The students really enjoyed their visit and they put all their effort to gather information about the paintings and even to do some drawing themselves!

The National Gallery offered our students the opportunity to study the work of Spain's greatest painters, such as Velázquez, Murillo, Zurbarán, El Greco and Goya. The majority of the collection represents the 'Golden Age of Spain', the great flourishing of the arts from about 1575 to 1700.

Diego Velázquez (1599 – 1660)

Velázquez was born in 1599 in Seville in southern Spain, at that time an important city with a thriving artistic community. At the age of eleven, Velázquez was apprenticed to Francisco Pacheco, Seville's most significant artist and art theorist. From Pacheco, Velázquez learned the technical skills of drawing and painting, still-life and portraiture and soon surpassed his master. Copies of his paintings spread all over Europe.

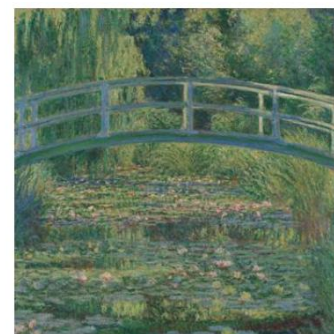

Students could fire their imagination across seven zones showcasing the science and maths surrounding us and seeing the world in bold new ways.



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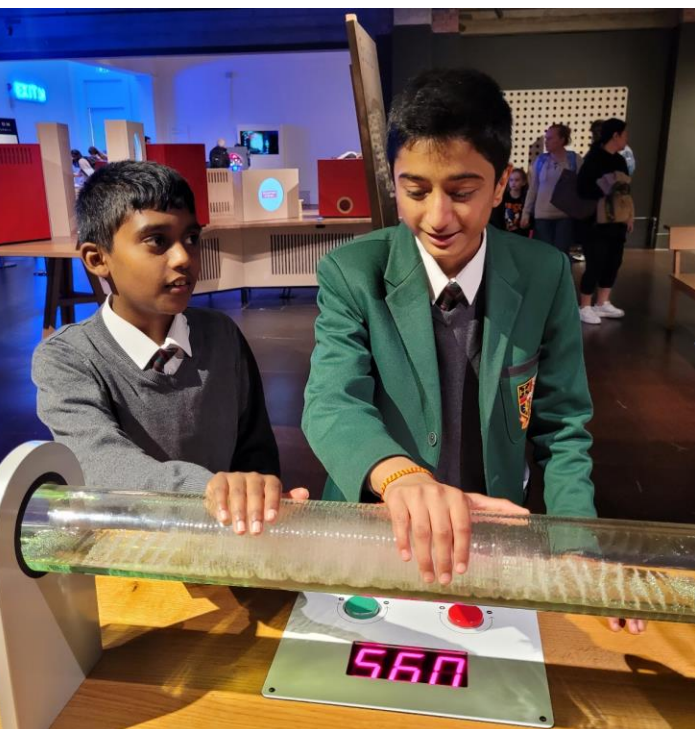
Testimonies

Careers Education

Year 10 pupils participated in a week long work experience placement in October. The pupils contacted businesses, wrote letters of application and CV's, to source placements in the industries they wished to work in and gain experience of. 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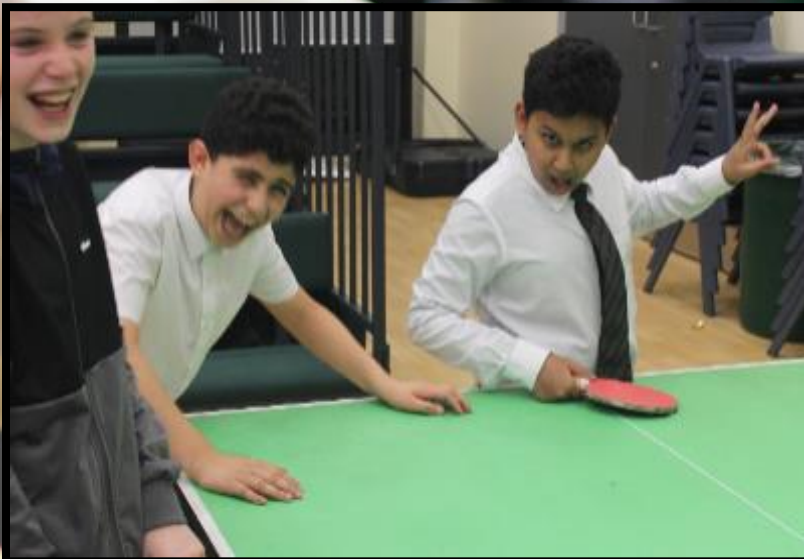
Youth Club
