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# History

### A Journey Through History: Exploring the British Empire and Migration to Britain - Canishias Jusay, 9C

#### Introduction:

**Paella - Spain's Signature Dish -** When you think of Spanish food, the iconic "Paella" springs to mind. Originating from Valencia, Paella is a colorful dish of rice, saffron, a variety of meats, or seafood, and an assortment of vegetables. The key to its rich taste is the 'socarrat' - the crispy layer of rice at the bottom of the pan.

Try saying it in Spanish: ¡La paella es deliciosa! (The paella is delicious!)

**Tapas - A Little Bit of Everything -** Moving to the heart of Spanish cuisine, "Tapas" are small, flavorful appetizers that range from olives and cheeses to calamari and 'patatas bravas' (spicy potatoes). Tapas aren't just food, they represent a social dining experience meant to encourage conversation.

**Churros Con Chocolate - The Sweet Side -** These long, fried dough pastries dusted with sugar are Spain's answer to donuts. Dip them into thick, hot chocolate for an indulgent treat that satisfies the niños y adultos alike!

Say it in Spanish: ¡Que rico! (How delicious!)

**Gazpacho - Refreshing and Cool -** This cold soup made from ripe tomatoes, fresh vegetables, olive oil, vinegar, and garlic is served in summer and is as refreshing as it is healthful. Spanish Phrase: Gazpacho es perfecto para el verano. (Gazpacho is perfect for the summer.)



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"Bon appétit!" - a phrase that's synonymous with the joy of eating, especially when it comes to French food. French cuisine is filled with rich flavors, diverse textures, and a certain "je ne sais quoi" that sets it apart. The French love eating out, so everywhere you encounter bistros, bars, streetside cafes and restaurants.

**The Art of Pastries: Pâtisserie Parfaite -** Enter any French bakery, and you'll meet the sweet aroma of buttery **croissants** (typically used for breakfast or filled with ham and cheese for a more filling meal later during the day) and colorful **macarons**. Macarons are the delicious sweet cookies filled with butter cream. Macarons come in many colours so you can distinguish on the taste of the filling such as pink for raspberry taste, brown for chocolate, yellow for vanilla or lemon, green for pistachio, blue for blueberry.

Les crêpes - sweet treats. The French pancakes are very thin and filled with chocolate sauce or fresh fruits. Sometimes they are enjoyed with savoury fillings. Crepes are very tasty, even when only sprinkled with sugar and folded.

**Le Fromage -** The French are known for their love of cheese. Brie, Camembert, Roquefort, and Comté are just a few of over 1,000 varieties of "fromage". Each region of France has its own specialty, and French people take great pride in their cheeses. Eating cheese in France it's an experience - preferably enjoyed with a slice of baguette and a dash of fig jam.

**Coq au Vin -** a classic French stew, combines chicken, wine, mushrooms, and sometimes even lardons (small strips of bacon) - a perfect dish for those cooler evenings.

**Bouillabaisse** - Seafood lovers would adore "Bouillabaisse", a traditional Provençal fish stew that originates from the port city of Marseille. It's a flavorful infusion of fish, shellfish, and aromatic herbs and spices.

Sweet Sensations: Les Desserts - No French meal is complete without dessert. "Crème brûlée" is a creamy custard topped with a layer of hard caramel - a perfect mix of textures. Another favorite is "Tarte Tatin", an upside-down pastry in which the fruit (usually apples) is caramelized before the tart is baked.

At Christmas Fayre we invited you all to take a bite of culture and taste some of the rich flavors of French and Spanish cuisine. We are looking forward to seeing you again in summer.
